We will examine how a strong data use culture can enable programs to effectively use data to ask and answer questions focused on the goal of advancing equity in early childhood special education. This session will define elements of a strong data use culture, examine what it means to be a data leader, explore how to effectively engage diverse stakeholders, and provide resources to help participants assess and improve their data use culture. Critical Information

- Data are not objective or neutral; people bring to their work their subjective experiences, lived experiences, and potential biases
- Data use culture should be embedded in all aspects of a program or organization
- Building a data use culture that focuses on equity will involve honest conversations, openness to shifting mindsets and practices, and ongoing reassessment
- Prioritizing meaningful stakeholder engagement throughout each stage of the data use cycle is critical to promoting equity
